After graduating from Mooroopna Secondary College, Chloe undertook VET business studies and launched her own online business, Dungala Creations. The business features Chloe's own artworks as well as a range of ceramics and homewares. She also works at Kaiela Arts Shepparton where she runs cultural and arts sessions.

Chloe volunteers with The Healing Foundation and she is a mentor to young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander teenage girls at Rumbalara. Chloe said that Ganbina's Leadership Program had given her a huge boost. "Ganbina has given me

incredible opportunities. If it wasn't for them, there's no way I'd be where I am today."

Next year, Chloe hopes to study at university in Melbourne and complete an undergraduate degree in Indigenous and cultural studies as well as marketing and communications. Her dream is to open her own art gallery.
