"It was great to meet so many young Indigenous people on the night and take them through all the different career options the Defence Force can give them," Dan said.

"I joined the army when I was 21 when I found out that I could get a career and come out with a trade," he said. "I originally signed up for four years, but after that, it was a no-brainer for me to stay, the benefits are great, I get paid more than my friends and I've travelled overseas and all over Australia.

"The army has trained me to be a paratrooper and a qualified chef and now I work in recruitment. I'm married with two children and I think it's a great life."

Dylan said that the Careers Night was an eyeopener for him. "I want to study architecture when I leave school and it was great to get so much information about different study options, Indigenous entry programs, scholarships, apprenticeships and industry possibilities," he said.

"I made a lot of really useful contacts on the night, it was fantastic."




