Ganbina's Pilot Expansion Program is well under way

We are making great progress with the roll out of Ganbina's Pilot Expansion Program. Ignatius Park College in Townsville started to trial our model in May this year and we are currently in partnership discussions with three other Queensland communities.

We have also entered into a Venture Partnership with the Collingwood Football Club's Barrawarn Program to discuss opportunities to pilot Ganbina's model in Gippsland.

This new Venture Partnership was launched at a special Indigenous dinner at the Collingwood Football Club during National Reconciliation Week last month.

"Our Pilot Expansion Program is a very important part of our goal to empower Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to achieve true social and economic equality in Australia," said CEO Anthony Cavanagh.

"Our work in the Goulburn Valley has proved that the Ganbina model is successful. For the last 15 years, young people in Shepparton on our JOBS4U2 program have out-performed their peers across the country, achieving outstanding results in education, training and employment.

"We are committed to sharing our learnings on a wider scale and helping other Indigenous communities to pilot the model for themselves. We look forward to exploring these opportunities with Barrawarn in Victoria."

David Emerson, Director of CFC's Stadia and Community, said: "We have always had tremendous respect for the success and impact of Ganbina's program. We are very excited at the prospect of working together to build a brighter future for young Indigenous people."

Ganbina and CFC launch new Venture Partnership

"It was so good to bring the Ganbina family and the Collingwood family together to talk about the potential roll-out of the Ganbina model in Gippsland," said Debby Lovett, Indigenous Programs Manager, Collingwood Football Club.

"It was a time of celebrating our culture with Indigenous entertainment, a bush tucker inspired menu and a fabulous auction of Indigenous art, sporting memorabilia and artefacts. They included a hand-carved Coolomon by Ben Church, a hollowed out piece of wood traditionally used as a digging tool or to gather food or as a carry cot for babies; and a possum skin football called a Marngrook which was used by mobs from the Western District when they came together to talk about trade."
